ROUTES

There are different routes into many careers, including full time study, apprenticeships and higher education. Higher and degree apprenticeships are being developed in sectors such as built environment, facilities management, quantity surveying and more. These involve working for a wage while you study for university level qualifications.

You need a good spread of subjects alongside geography, particularly English, maths and sciences. For some geography degrees you may need these at GCSE A*-B (or 9-6 / 9-5).

If you're passionate about the environment, renewable energy is a growing industry and low carbon is a key work sector in the Sheffield City Region. There is a range of careers in this sector, from energy engineering to business, finance, marketing and PR. Some of them require good maths and sciences.
